■ Requirements for Historic Registration:

For vehicles previously registered on historical plates, you will need the following:

- 1. RMS Conditional Registration Renewal form (sent to you by RMS prior to renewal);
- 2. "Historic Vehicle Declaration" form, duly filled out with you and your trucks details, (Do not fill out the club registrar's part)
- 3. "Pink Slip" available from a local mechanics garage.

<u>For vehicles NOT previously registered on historic plates</u>, you will need to fill out a registration application form plus you will need item 2. and item 3. above.

Send all originals <u>plus a copy of each</u> to Steve Pardey, 246 Spinks Road, Glossodia 2756

Steve will return the originals to you after he has completed his part of the process so that you can then go to the RMS to complete the historic registration of your vehicle.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION:- because Historic Registrations are not transferable, when purchasing an historically registered vehicle the SELLER must remove the plates from the vehicle and the registration cancelled at the RMS before it leaves his/her possession, that is, before the BUYER takes delivery. The BUYER must also insist on a receipt as proof of purchase. The RMS staff will insist on a receipt as PROOF OF PURCHASE. It is then up to the BUYER to arrange a TRAVEL PERMIT or to have the vehicle transported 'home'.

Failing to follow this procedure could deem the vehicle stolen and/or unregistered when not in the BUYER'S name if questioned by the Authorities. This is explained clearly on the back of the purple Certificate of Registration.

Barry Locock, is the proprietor of Turtle Nursery and Landscape Supplies and has restored an AEC Mammoth Major. It was the very first vehicle Barry purchased to commence his landscaping and nursery business back in 1975.

He had worked for four years as a truck driver for Martin Brothers, a landscape supplies business in Dural. Barry learned all he could about the business. The Mammoth Major was one of the vehicles he drove so when he decided to go out on his own, he made an offer to buy the truck and it was accepted.



The Mammoth Major was given a thorough workout as Turtle Transport business prospered due to Barry's long hours behind the wheel and the business acumen of his first wife, Jan.

Barry and the Mammoth worked their butts off those first years but in 1978 Barry needed a larger vehicle and traded it in on an International 3074B prime mover and trailer.

The Mammoth Major had done its job and Turtle Transport morphed into Turtle Nursery and Landscape Supplies and growing into one of the major such businesses in the state. It now operates on large premises at Rouse Hill and Windsor. There are 65 employees including Barry's three sons and one grandson who recently joined as an apprentice mechanic.

Eight years ago, on impulse, Barry decided to hunt down the vehicle which was the catalyst for the subsequent success of Turtle. After a fair bit of detective work and some successful haggling, the Mammoth Major was brought back to Barry's Rouse Hill home. It rested for several years before Barry became serious about returning it to its former glory. And now its in better shape than when it first rolled off the production line back in 1969. The Mammoth Major, registered on historic plates, is now destined to be driven to truck shows to be shown off.
